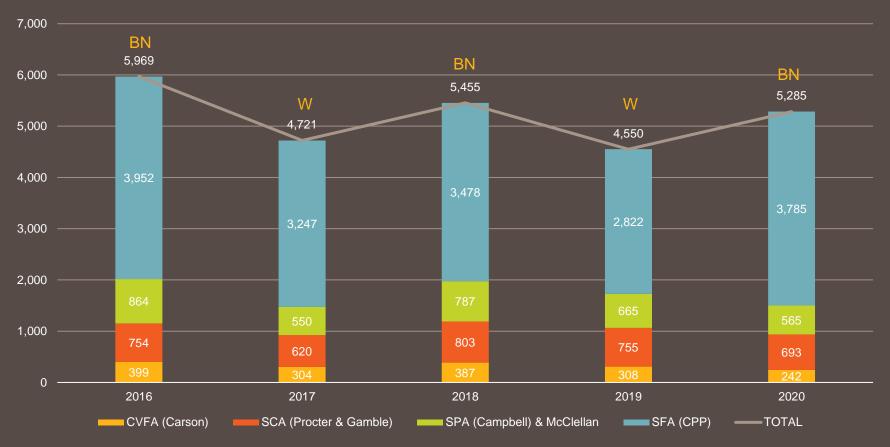

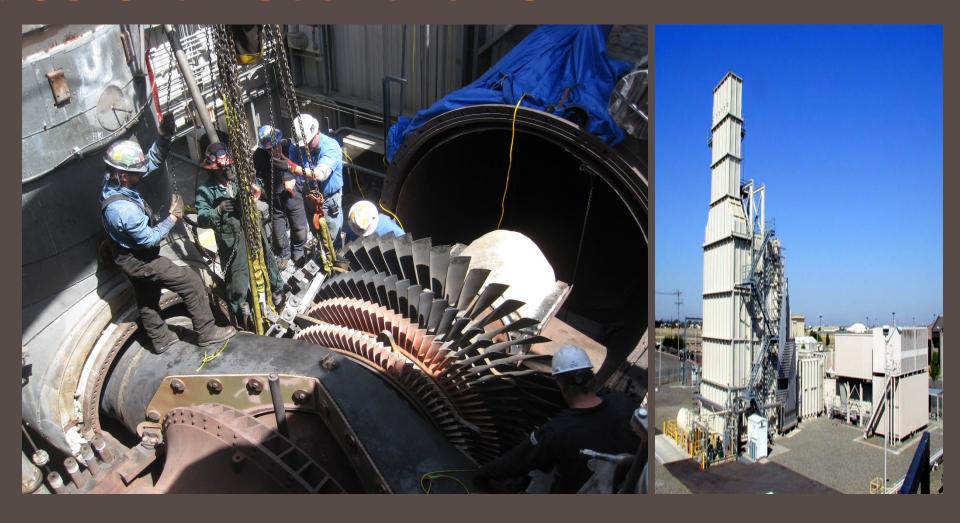

# Comments on SMUD's 2022 Projected Thermal Power Plant Budgets

Rick Codina on behalf of 350 Sacramento

Thank you for considering these comments on the Joint Special Meeting of NCGA1, SFA and NCEA's review of the proposed 2022 budget for these SMUD thermal power plants. I understand that the budgets will be on the consent calendar and not normally subject to extensive discussion. However, the 2022 budget values raise a number of questions which we believe should be explored more fully in light of SMUD's plan to attain zero carbon by 2030.

1. <u>Recommendation:</u> SMUD staff should provide power plant operational budget data in the context of the 2030 Zero Carbon Plan.

All staff reports on power plant operations should include the projected greenhouse gas impacts and the progress being made toward the Board's goal of carbon zero by the end of the decade. As an example, I have developed the following table based on the current power plant reports which compare 2021 with 2022 in terms of generation, natural gas consumption and climate emissions<sup>1</sup>.

2. **Recommendation:** SMUD staff should provide more information on why the gas plants must provide substantially more electricity in 2022 than the current year.

As indicated in the prior table, in 2022 these gas plants will see an increase of nearly 19% in year-over-year power output, coupled with a 26% increase in natural gas usage and corresponding carbon dioxide emissions. This level of increase is distressing and bears further explanation.

From the staff budget reporting on November 9<sup>th</sup>, we can identify the major culprits for the needed increase of approximately 900,000 MWh. As indicated in the following table, a huge drop in net purchased power accounts for 60% of the needed power, with diminished hydroelectric adding another 28%. Increased sales and a shortfall in SMUD's renewable power are only minor impacts.

The question in our mind is why SMUD plans to reduce its reliance in outside purchased power in 2022, which in many cases in 2021 came from renewable sources. The answer, in part, may be because of the large price increase of approximately 80% in forward prices as indicated in the following table from the staff's November 5<sup>th</sup> presentation. We wonder if in 2022, SMUD may find its long-term lower-priced gas contracts used to power the thermal plants to be a more financially beneficial alternative, even then renewable power on the market?

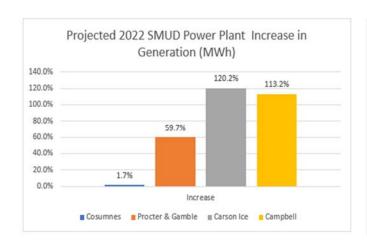

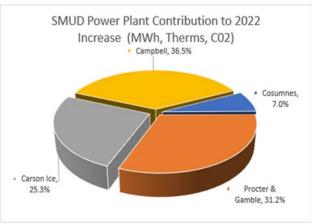
Whatever the causes, staff has the responsibility to explain to the Board and the public why 2022 will require such a relatively large increase in electricity generation and climate emissions from its own gas plants.

**3.** <u>Recommendation:</u> SMUD staff should provide a full explanation on why it plans to operate its less efficient gas power plants more than Cosumnes in 2022.

Cosumnes is among the most efficient power plants in the state with a heat rate of 6,830 Btuh/kWh, more than 22% better than its smaller sibling plants. Yet, the projected increase in output for Cosumnes in 2022 is only 1.7% more than in 2021, while the other plants will see increases ranging from 60% to 120%. As illustrated below, these less efficient plants will bear 93% of the burden for the 2022 projected increases in energy production, gas use and emissions. In fact, this preferred use of the less efficient plants results in the 7.0% added emissions relative to the increase in generation. We can imagine that this projected situation may also have several underlying causes.

• Plant load factors may govern operational status. One possibility is that because the loading factor for Cosumnes is already quite high at 73%, it cannot be relied upon for many more added hours of operation. The operational data (see table, following page) also suggests that the smaller thermal plants have been operating at much lower load factors, ranging from 19% to 43% and therefore have more operational runtime available.





- Peakers will be needed next year for transitional support. Another possibility for the increase in thermal plant output is that these "peakers" will be needed for load-following during the evening ramps and to support intermittency the rapid variation in the output of renewable generation as more wind and solar generation is added to SMUD's system. Cosumnes may not be able to ramp quickly enough to follow these ramps. Hopefully, this increase is temporary as new balancing resources such as battery storage are brought on-line.
- Maintenance Outages. Another factor worth noting is that Cosumnes, alone among the thermal plants, will undergo a major equipment overhaul in 2022 which will presumably make it unavailable for part of the year.

Regardless, staff should explain why SMUD will be relying on less efficient, more emission-producing power plants to meet its 2022 generation requirements.

4. <u>Recommendation:</u> SMUD staff should present the Board and the public with a plan and timeline for the closure of its gas plants in accordance with the 2030 Carbon Zero Plan.

In August 2020, SMUD staff projected capital expenditures for the natural gas plants of more than \$10 million for 2021 and \$42 million for 2022. Our concern at that time was that any large capital improvements, particularly in the smaller plants, would result in stranded assets as these plants were phased out according to the 2030 Carbon Zero Plan.

The current budget plan shows that capital costs in 2021 and 2022 have in fact been greatly reduced and even zeroed out in the case of Campbell and Procter & Gamble. Total savings is \$8.7 million for 2021 and more than \$22 million for 2022.

While these capital projections are heartening, the projected increase in 2022 power plant operation and carbon emissions are a clear setback to the longer-term goal of climate zero only eight years in the future. Staff reports that it plans to shutter Campbell and McClellan by 2024 and re-tool the other plants as feasible starting in 2027. To ensure that future budgets remain on track, the Board should call upon staff to prepare and present a detailed plan on how SMUD's thermal fleet will be powered down or carbon-neutralized in the remaining timeframe.
