Reasons for contract change


 Unanticipated cost increases based on market factors that have far exceeded the original forecast for this contract when put in place during 2019.

 Due to current <u>+80-week lead time</u> (increasing) for distribution substation transformers, SMUD needs to order additional transformers now to ensure on time delivery for planned construction.

Power and Distribution Transformers (+72%)




- Cost pressures driven by commodities, labor, and demand increases through this period
- From the start of 2019 our unit prices have increased by 72%
- The power and distribution transformer cost index has increased by 72% in the same time period because the contract rates escalations are governed by the index



5-year plan

Transformer unit forecast



- 5-year plan forecasts a need for 60-70 transformer units through 2028
- Substation development is planned to support residential expansion, economic growth in the region, replacing end of life assets, and to support electrification
- Staff is soliciting new contracts and anticipates those to be in place by the end of 2023



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
